<u>vawinetime</u>VirginiaWineTime Virginia Wine Time is working in conjunction with the Embassy of the Republic of Kosovo and Sandler Trade LLC to taste wines from Kosovo.



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime First up is the Vere E Bardhe 2007 bottled by Stone Castle. Dry white wine. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime We noted 11% alcohol. From the bottle suggest a blend of Semendria, Riesling, Semillion. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>

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vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Presents pale straw color. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Tropical fruit aromatics. Paul detects a hint of pear on the nose. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Similar fruit characteristics in the mouth. Fruit upfront then it fades. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



<u>vawinetime</u>VirginiaWineTime Warren would serve well chilled as an aperitif or as a light sipper with light cheeses or fruit. <u>#Kosovo #wine</u>



vawinetime The second wine is the Vere E Kuqe 2008 bottled by Stone Castle. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime This is a blend of prokup, frankovik, and gamay. It has 11% alcohol. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime Clear garnet color in the glass. <u>#Kosovo</u> #wine



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Aromas of cherry, raspberry, and fall spices. Not familiar with prokup and frankovik. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime Wondering if they share characteristics similar to the gamay grape. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime In the mouth we notice spicy elements up front followed by cherry and red berry flavors. #Kosovo #wine



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Light bodied with a shorter finish. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Fruit flavors seem to move forward when enjoyed with herbed lamb chops. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Next up is the Pinot Noire 2003 Euro Wine Iliria produced and bottled by Biopak. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime It's 12% alcohol. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime Clear ruby color and bright cherry on the nose. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Cherry flavors with earthy/brambly elements and a longer finish than the first red wine. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Nice to sip as I finish my lamb chop. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Next is the Cabernet Sauvignon 2003 Euro Wine Iliria produced and bottled by Biopak. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime It has 12% alcohol. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime We noted a whiff of violet, dark fruit, ash, and black pepper on the nose. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



<u>vawinetime</u>VirginiaWineTime Dark cherry fruit flavors then crushed herb with black pepper toward the end. More medium bodied. <u>#Kosovo #wine</u>



vawinetime Wade from the Vranc grape anticipating a bolder wine with this one. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



<u>vawinetime</u>VirginiaWineTime Ugh...wet card board on the nose. Can only mean one thing. This bottle is corked. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>



vawinetime VirginiaWineTime Okay, giving this a second sniff. This is definitely corked. <u>#Kosovo</u> <u>#wine</u>
